Executive Director's Letter

Well, if 2020 has taught us anything – it's to expect the unexpected. Again. And again. And again.

This from a rather busy working mom who has a kindergartener in his fourth (non-consecutive) week of virtual learning, as we've twice been thrown into two-week e-learning stints as a result of school shutdowns due to COVID-19. In fact, in October and November, he will literally have been out of school more than in school this year. And now we're trying to "plan" how to make it through Marion County's virtual learning mandate through January 15.



And this mama just so happens to have a "little" conference to host and board meeting to prepare for that "final" week of e-learning. And I wouldn't pretend to know what we can expect that week. Other than that I intend to find somewhere else to be than with our six-year-old and one-year-old, if our alternative schooling/childcare solution gets changed between now and then. I also know words like "co-op" and "pods" are quickly beginning to scare me and could make for a very strange new year.

In fact, I think 2021 might actually feel weirder than 2020. In 2020, so much has been thrust upon us. We've learned we can roll with the punches. And we'll keep doing the same in 2021. Or the landmarks will be different. I think they'll look like more collaboration/less controversy around the issues we care about, as other elements of the statehouse agenda will heat up: the budget, redistricting, COVID response – and maybe only what "has" to get done getting done. But we'll still be doing whatever WE can to mobilize members around areas where reform is needed – whether we get that done legislatively or administratively – and responding as needed to issues that arise.

To get a better sense of the reform and defensive agenda items we've set for the coming year (with your input) and interact virtually with other members and your legislators – new and old – we'll be hosting three Policy & Pizza (hold the pizza) events in December. And since the statehouse experience will be so different next year, and we can't fully plan an in-person event that far in advance (or at least consider our plans reliable), you do NOT want to miss

this chance to interact this year – before the strange politics (or ways of achieving our legislative goals) of 2021 take hold. These gatherings will help us prepare and inform legislators regarding our priorities before our 2021 "statehouse" day, which may or may not (probably not) take place in the statehouse.

So, go ahead, register to attend a <u>P&P event</u>, and get ready – buckle up – and prepare as much as you can for the ride that will be lobbying and advocating in the era of COVID-19. Where literally anything can – and likely will – happen. But the good news is the one thing we can plan on: we'll be right there with you – Again. And again. And again. – to make the very best of the current unknowns.

Final Evicted in Indiana Webinar

Researchers find <u>248,000-313,000</u> Hoosier households are at risk of eviction due to COVID-19. Another recent study <u>estimates</u> 150,000 evictions will be filed by January 2021 and \$376,000,000 – \$485,000,000 will be lost in rent shortfall in Indiana, unless policy solutions are implemented.

Press Release from IIWF on the new OCC Rule

The Indiana Institute for Working Families, Prosperity Indiana's co-lead for the Indiana Assets & Opportunity Network, published a press release on November 10 urging Indiana legislators to provide rent relief and protections for Hoosiers. They draw attention to a new rule finalized by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC), which may embolden predatory lenders to undermine Indiana's interest rate caps. In late October, the OCC issued a "true lender" rule that will facilitate "rent-a-bank" schemes where non-bank lenders can issue loans above Indiana's interest rate limitations as long as a bank is named as the lender in the origination documents. COVID-19 Housing Resources

- The <u>State's Rental Assistance Portal</u> is still accepting applications for rental assistance from qualifying Indiana renters living outside of Marion County. To ensure equal access and transparency, IHCDA is now providing bi-weekly updates regarding the rental assistance funding. This includes information on the state's COVID-19 Rental Assistance Program as well as the Emergency Solutions Grant CARES Act (ESG-CV) rental assistance program. <u>View IHCDA's report from November 13.</u>
- The <u>IndyRent Assistance Portal</u> is for Marion County residents that are having a hard time paying rent; apply through the IndyRent Assistance Portal.
- For <u>Mortgage Assistance</u>, Indiana's Hardest Hit Fund (HHF) is available to help Indiana
 homeowners who have fallen behind on their mortgage payments or who are unable to
 make future payments.
- Applications are being accepted for the <u>Low-Income Home Energy Assistance</u>
 <u>Program (LIHEAP)</u>. LIHEAP provides a one-time annual benefit to help with the high cost of home energy. An additional \$350 CARES Act benefit is also available to qualifying households experiencing a reduction in income due to COVID-19.

Updated FAQ for CDC Eviction Moratorium

On Friday, September 4, the CDC's National Eviction Moratorium took effect; the agency has since <u>released an updated FAQ</u>. Prosperity Indiana has created a <u>Federal Eviction</u>

Moratorium Flyer for renters to know if they are covered and their responsibilities. In case you

missed it, PI released a blog post last month on what the moratorium means for Hoosiers.

To be protected, qualified renters facing eviction should immediately provide a signed declaration to their landlords. For more details about the moratorium and a sample declaration that renters can use, refer to the NLIHC's and NHLP's <u>Overview of National Eviction Moratorium</u>. Community Loan Center

Prosperity Indiana is the Indiana statewide coordinator for the Community Loan Center (CLC), an affordable small-dollar loan program that serves as a payday-lending alternative. The CLC program allows local lenders to make online loans directly to employees of participating employers. Borrowers apply for a CLC loan online, the loan is deposited in the borrower's bank account, and borrowers then repay their loans each payday through payroll deduction. Twenty-three counties in Indiana are currently served by an Indiana-based CLC lender.

New policy guidance has been posted to IHCDA's website for the Individual Development Accounts (IDA) program. The updates include:

IDDC will consider grant requests of between \$50,000 and \$250,000. Entities that have previously received a Destination Development Grant may not apply for additional Destination Development funds for two years from the date of their last award.

The deadline for applications is Jan. 11, 2021, by 4 p.m. ET. Finalists will be announced on Feb. 15, 2021. IDDC will announce the award recipients in March.

labeled as questionnaires dealing with PPP "loan necessity." The forms "are for specific borrowers with PPP loans worth \$2 million and above."

Comments on the reasonableness of the forms are due November 25, 2020.

The SBA also posted a high-level overview of what borrowers have to do as part of the PPP forgiveness process: Paycheck Protection Program Loan Forgiveness.

- number of IDAs an Administrator can set up for vehicle purchases.
- Outcome Tracker is no longer required for IDA018, IDA019, or IDA020.
- Foster kids can be considered head of their household when determining their income eligibility as an applicant.
- If a foster kid participant moves out of Indiana, their Administrator can choose to keep their account open for up to six months in case they return in that timeframe.
- If an IDA applicant lives with a dependent that is a full-time student, that dependent's income does not need to be included in the applicant's household income.

New Levels for Indiana Main Street Program

On Nov. 9, the Office of Community and Rural Affairs announced improvements to the Indiana Main Street program and will begin accepting applications for new organizations to join the program.

This new system allows member communities to engage in long-range planning and downtown revitalization at three distinct levels: OCRA's Downtown Affiliate Network, Indiana Accredited Main Street, and/or Nationally Accredited Main Street.

The Health Sector and Housing

Shelterforce is featuring a series on the partnership between the health care sector and housing.

Decades of accumulated research have shown that social and physical environments and economic factors—the opportunities and barriers facing individuals and families in their daily lives -play a larger role than medical care in shaping health outcomes.

Prevention Steps for Close Contacts

General Information & Precautions

- Wash your hands for 20 seconds.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily.
- Avoid touching your face.
- Encourage teleworking when feasible.
- Practice social distancing when possible and avoid close contact with others. This may include staggering work schedules and decreasing social contact in the workplace.

Decisions about the implementation of community measures will be made by local and state officials, in consultation with federal officials as appropriate, and based on the scope of the outbreak and the severity of illness. Implementation will require extensive community engagement with ongoing and transparent public health communications (CDC).

Prosperity Indiana's Response

As of July 15, Prosperity Indiana team members are able to return to the office to work. Staff will be rotating days that they are present in the office. While most team members continue to work remotely at this time, we have compiled the following information about our return to work plan.

Our re-opening plan includes:

- Limiting staff in the office to no more than three at a time and fewer than 10 short-term, staggered visitors daily to allow for physical distancing
- Providing adequate PPE for staff and visitors, along with extra hand sanitizing supplies, tissues, and wipes for high touch surfaces.
- Implementing a return-to-work plan that complies with the Back on Track Roadmap, CDC, Indiana Department of Health, and OSHA guidelines.
